## From Duncan

Dear friends,

What are you doing this Lent?

We may find ourselves being asked this question as we enter the season of Lent on 26<sup>th</sup> February. Lent is traditionally a season of preparation for Holy Week and Easter, a time of reflecting on our spiritual health, a period of being penitent. But sometimes I wonder whether I fall into the trap of doing too much in Lent – trying to give something up, reading a religious book, leading a Lent Course and holding special services. Maybe a Lenten challenge for me - and perhaps you - would be to focus more on simply "being". It would be nice if lots of people in the parish got involved in the different things on offer for you to do during Lent (see advert elsewhere in this magazine for articles)! However, I think it's important that we mark this season by making space for God, looking at where Jesus is leading us, allowing the Holy Spirit to change our hearts and minds.

One morning, Amanda and I were saying Morning Prayer together, and at the end we both commented how good it was. To me it presents a good reminder that if only we took more time to look around us, we would see God at work in many, many ways. And so I started to reflect:

I'm sitting at Evensong in church, and perhaps it's the music, or the Spirit, but the darkness doesn't seem too strong. I'm praying for miracles in Ashbourne — for healings, and redemption, and justice, and revival, and all those usual 'God' kind of things. But tonight, as I do so, I find myself suddenly startled like a boy blinking at fireworks - bewildered by how many miracles there already are.

It occurs to me that here in my town today, doctors dispensed healing - can you imagine anything more wonderful? Neighbours did favours. Dog-walkers in the park silently admired the shape of trees. Jokes were told in nursing homes. For a moment or two, thousands and thousands of people prayed, or wished, or merely unwittingly wanted what God wanted.

Chances are that somewhere today a young man and a young woman began to fall in love (although they don't yet know it). A teenager picked up rubbish she had not dropped. A single mother decided, just for once, to buy herself a slice of chocolate cake and to celebrate the moment in long, slow, mouthfuls of happiness. A painter-decorator stepped back from a wall he'd just painted the colour of claret, and maybe at that moment the sunlight broke through the window, and he saw that it was a good piece of work. A man resisted the temptation to click the link he wouldn't want his wife to see. Maybe he failed yesterday. Maybe he'll click it tomorrow. But today he overcame. In the hospital, perhaps a surgeon pinned a broken arm with immaculate skill. Delicious food was prepared and cooked and served in thousands of homes joyously. A vicar's words, so carefully crafted, brought a little comfort to grieving relatives. People cried, but a check-out girl smiled at a lonely old lady.

People died, of course, but babies were also born. From time to time today, I was born too. We all were. A million, minor miracles.

We do not pray ex nihilo. We pray for more of whatever it is we see. Nothing comes from nothing - certainly not faith like this. Tonight, I am aware of the evidence of miracles; the pre- existing goodness, the presence of Christ in these streets, these surgeries, these schools, these art galleries, these pubs, these homes, these hospital wards. Witnessing so many minor miracles, I applaud the world. If all of this is happening all around me, what might not happen next?

And so I sit here in this place of prayer and it seems self-evident that there is more light in the night than darkness in the day. There is goodness breaking through, everywhere I look.

Ultimately, almost inevitably, love wins the day quietly.

I wonder how much more our relationship with God would grow if we were aware of the daily miracles he performs? Perhaps this Lent, you might like to commit yourself to spending time in the presence of God, looking out for miracles, and turning to him in thanks and praise for the wonders he is doing all around you.

solemnity to come on Good Friday. The service ends abruptly, reflecting the chaos and confusion of the night Jesus was arrested.

# It's all too easy to jump from the celebration of Palm Sunday to the joy of Easter day, without experiencing the emotions of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

#### This Lent and Easter, why not join us in the journey?



Easter is almost upon us, and at Ashbourne this year there will be the traditional cycle of services: the Palm Sunday procession, Tenebrae, Compline from Monday to Wednesday, the Maundy Thursday meal, the Good Friday stations of the cross, the choir singing Stainer's Crucifixion, and then the great Easter day celebrations. Palm Sunday, Easter: these you may be familiar

with – but what about Tenebrae?

The word 'tenebrae' is Latin for shadows. The purpose of the Tenebrae service is to recreate the emotional aspects of the passion story, so this is not supposed to be a happy service, because the occasion is not happy. If your expectation of Christian worship is that it should always be joyful and exhilarating, you won't appreciate this service until the second time you attend it!

The dramatic retelling of the events leading up to Jesus' death is by candlelight, and as each step in the story unfolds, so a candle is snuffed out. As the story darkens, the shadows lengthen — until only one candle remains, and a solo voice slowly sings a lament.

Then Jesus' death is announced.

The final candle is extinguished; the book is slammed shut. There is silence – unbroken by blessing or final prayer. In Luke we're told that once the crowd saw Jesus die, they went away in "deep sorrow". But Jesus' friends stood at a distance, watching. For some reason they stay in front of the cross, with all that they had hoped for, hanging in front of them – destroyed. Tenebrae is a very uncomfortable kind of service. It resolves without hope. It leaves us, like Jesus' friends, standing at the cross. And it

leaves us there for the whole of Holy week – in silent vigil, in ignorance of what will happen on Easter Sunday.

All too often we skip over the significance of Holy week. It is a place of confusion, of loss, of anger; days for voicing doubts and what-ifs. Perhaps they are also days of wonder: "Surely this was the Son of God". For some it's a day of realisation, for others of hope.

It is a week, not for rushing to close the deal, but for sitting with our questions. Not just our questions – but those others bring us too. It's a week to sit with those who rail at the absence of God, those who feel loss, those who are not ready for neat answers and certainties. In our accelerated culture. Tenebrae is a chance to travel slowly from the horror and love of the cross, to the power and hope of the empty tomb.

#### MAYBE FOR LENT?



"Alone in Berlin" by Hans Fallada is a novel we plan to discuss with friends when they visit us in Ashbourne in April. I purchased a copy recently (Penguin 2009, £9.99) and found it a compelling read but far from an easy one emotionally.

First published in 1947, it's described by the Jewish writer Primo Levi as "the greatest book ever written about the German resistance to the Nazis". The main mover in the novel is Otto, an ordinary German in a low-paid job. He tries to stay out of trouble. But the death of his only

son at the front in France shocks him into an extraordinary act of resistance. He starts with the smallest of actions to stand against Hitler but knows that, if caught, he'll be executed.

Soon his wife Anna joins him in this work and they diligently plant seeds to draw attention to the awfulness of Hitler's leadership. Anna's one wish is that, whatever happens, they will be together until the end. The Gestapo tries many approaches to track down the guilty couple and eventually they succeed.

Otto, once in prison, is visited by one very good chaplain and one appalling chaplain. He tells them both that there is no God, but there are hints towards the end that perhaps he has begun to think differently. The decency of another prisoner with whom Otto shares a cell, and of a Jewish professor who was a neighbour in their apartment block, shines out from one of the bleakest pictures, otherwise, I've ever seen painted in words.

"Alone in Berlin" might deepen our sense of what Christ achieved. He too endures everything that human wickedness could devise for him, and shows us the divine way of absorbing evil and turning it to good account. This is not so very different from what Otto and Anna, in this fictionalised version of a true story, quietly and courageously also achieve.

So maybe, if you're looking for something inspiring but disturbing to read before Easter, "Alone in Berlin" is the book for you.

Maybe for Lent.....


#### ST. OSWALD'S WALKING GROUP



#### Saturday January 25<sup>th</sup> 2020

There was a splendid turnout for our second January walk, with 14 of us plus Fly and Rustie meeting at Weag's Bridge in the Manifold Valley, having successfully navigated all the country lanes and hairpin bends to get there!

The route of the walk, entirely in Staffordshire, was specially devised to include a visit to the village of Waterfall, where Anthony Hall, one of founder members of our walking group, was born and is buried in the churchyard of St. James and St. Bartholomew. Anthony was a very keen walker, regularly participating in our monthly walks and joining in all our bi-annual long-distance walking holidays – indeed he was responsible for discovering two of them on the bookshelves of the local charity shops: A Dales Walk in 2014 and the Furness Trail in 2016. He is very much missed and fondly remembered by all of us.



Setting off northwards up the Manifold Trail we passed Thor's Cave high above in the limestone cliffs on our left, and reached Wetton Mill. Here we left the tarmac to walk west along the rather muddy and slippery banks of the Hoo Brook.

Everyone managed to stay upright however and after about half a mile we climbed out of the valley to the hilltop village of Grindon. Here we stopped for coffee by the church, taking advantage of the "seating" in the children's playground!

We continued our walk south along lanes and bridleways towards Waterfall, passing several farms in varying states of repair, with lovely views west over the moorlands. After the hamlet of Back o' th' Brook we crossed a ford and reached Waterfall church. There has been a church on this site since the twelfth century. Inside is a striking Norman arch and two of the three bells date from the fifteenth century. The impressive stone pillars at the churchyard entrance were originally chimneys at nearby Ilam Hall. The church is beautifully kept and we enjoyed a very warm welcome from the church warden, Anthony's sister- in- law, who made us all a cup of tea! After lunch here our return leg was down along lanes and what looked like a very old pathway lined with gnarled trees to regain the Manifold Trail which we followed back to our starting point.

It had been a super day altogether - good walk, good company and good memories. It was rounded off nicely by tea and delicious home-made cakes at the Schoolhouse Tearoom in Wetton, which kindly stayed open late for us!

The Magellanic are entirely black and white with thin border like bands of black around their neck and torso for a slight zebra effect.

We concluded with refreshments and chatting. If you would like to come along and join our WI, we have a variety of speakers every year and friendships formed and social events, make for a really interesting past-time.
