## **Ministry Thought for the Week**

Like me, you probably saw a good deal about Children in Need recently on television. I was interested in the way young people described how they had been helped by Children in Need.

Among them were those who were carers for their parents who suffered serious illness. As well as explaining clearly what they needed to do for their parents, they told how they looked after their siblings, ran the home, shopped, cleaned, did the laundry and many other tasks, as well as trying to get their homework done and get to school.

It is so good to hear what Children in Need have been able to do and the gratitude expressed by the young people, but what impressed me most was the way in which they spoke, with no complaints, just a calm acceptance of the responsibility they had taken on.

It reminded me of when I was a tutor for a Year 9 group at a Comprehensive School, a group of boys and girls, many with particular difficulties, with whom I had worked, on a one to one basis.

I was concerned, therefore, when one of the girls who appeared not to be troubled by serious problems and whose academic work, attendance and punctuality were excellent, came to apologise for not having done her homework on time and to ask me if she could hand it in after the weekend. I assured her that she could certainly do that, but also asked her if there was a problem, because it was such an unusual request from her.

She explained to me that it had been a difficult week because her mother was having a bad spell with her Multiple Sclerosis; she had severe pain, her mobility was very limited and she suffered loss of vision and coordination. Jane (I'll call her) needed to spend extra time nursing her mother and looking after her younger siblings including shopping, cleaning, cooking, laundry and getting them off to school. Her Dad did as much as he could, but his working hours made that difficult.

I had no idea that Jane's mother had MS and that Jane had accepted the responsibility of maintaining the life of her family calmly and willingly. All families are different, but all the young people I heard on TV talking about their care of family members seemed to have the same acceptance of the responsibility, not as a burden, but as part of their relationship with their family.

Some months later I met Jane's mother at a Parents' Evening. She was having a better period with her MS and she was keen to speak with me about Jane's contribution to their family life and her success in school. It was good to hear how much she respected her daughter and was grateful to Jane for relieving her of so much, even when her MS was a little better.

One of my concerns about young people today is that many adults talk at them constantly and do not listen to what they have to say, and many of them are not given any respect or

responsibility. I am not suggesting that children should all have the amount of responsibility that Jane had, but to be given the duty to do something helpful on a regular basis, and to be thanked and appreciated for it, can be a very valuable part of their development.

In Matthew's Gospel Chapter 19 v 14 we have the extremely well known words,

Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.'

Unfortunately, particularly in the last two centuries, there have been many paintings and other depictions of these words which show Jesus looking rather like Santa Claus with a little crowd of rather soppy looking children.

In fact Jesus is saying very strongly that the characteristics of children, such as clear thought, honesty, openness and willingness to take action are exactly those needed by the inhabitants of the Kingdom of Heaven. It is a huge responsibility and worthy of the greatest respect.

# An Entangled Church







When Dwayne joined us, he asked us to pray for a future we could imagine, knowing that there are difficult times ahead.

Dwayne preached on Sunday about chinks of light appearing, chinks that can shine a new light on our thinking. It became apparent to me during a different service that the 'job' of a priest is very much about the here and now - bringing the breath of Christ into the lives we are living today. It helped me see a different way of thinking about church and its connectedness.

Bear with me, because my thought started a long way off; it started with the concept of entanglement, which has two meanings that I know of, so far. First it is a founding principle in quantum computers. Entanglement provides incredible security for this computing and communication platform. Secondly, it describes how fungi entangles itself with the roots of plants to deliver nutrient to them, without which they could not live.

In my visits to local churches as Lay Chair of the Deanery, I started to realise there is another dimension to embrace. I call it a kind of 'entanglement' because of the deep rooted relationship the church has with its local people which goes back to time immemorial. Records of births,

marriages, and deaths demonstrate the entangled network of relationships that form a rich cultural carpet deeply interwoven across our nation, all founded within our local churches.

In a recent poll carried out for the Church of England, there is some support for this. It shows that two in five people, or 43 per cent of all adults, report having had contact with their local church, the majority of these, or 53 per cent, for services and worship but also 23 per cent – nearly seven million people in the UK – for community support. More than three quarters of the population – 77 per cent – said historic cathedrals and churches are local and national treasures. And two in five – 41% – said they had visited a church or cathedral simply to find a quiet space for reflection or prayer, with this figure rising to 50 per cent amongst young adults in the 18 to 34 age range. Increasingly families live apart. And yet is human nature for us to want to belong; to have an identity, amongst other things. This research illustrates the value people put on having a church near them.

So, the past informs the future, as our beloved Queen Elizabeth II used to reminded us. Subconsciously, perhaps the nation understands the stability that church provides, even though there is much 'noise' to distract us all from Christ's message. The Chancellor of my university always reminded us during every graduation speech he gave, not to be afraid of introducing new ideas but to be very careful about discarding old ones.

I propose we pray for ways to honour this rich legacy - by protecting our local churches - they are, after all, spaces that also unite us with Christ.

#### **Isaiah 2.1-5**

Isaiah warns his listeners that God has seen the ways they live and must return to him. They must expect punishment.

This is what Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem: In the last days the mountain of the Lord's temple will be established as the highest of the mountains; it will be exalted above the hills, and all nations will stream to it. Many peoples will come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the temple of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths." The law will go out from Zion, the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore. Come, descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

#### Matthew 24.36-44

"But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken

and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.

#### Something to think about

The Jews of Jesus's day were concerned about 'The Day of the Lord', the time when God would bring human history to an end and bring in his kingly rule. Jesus told them they must be prepared for it at all times.

Almighty God, as your kingdom dawns,

turn us from the darkness of sin to the light of holiness,

that we may be ready to meet you

in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

#### **Post Communion**

O Lord our God, make us watchful and keep us faithful

as we await the coming of your Son our Lord;

that, when he shall appear, he may not find us sleeping in sin

but active in his service and joyful in his praise;

through Jesus Christ our Lord.







#### Life on our planet as you've never seen it before


