Blessed are the Peacemakers

I've been thinking about the phrase, 'Blessed are the peacemakers.' I find it hard to read those words without thinking of the divisions in our country and the world. Minnesota, in particular, has been on my mind and in my prayers over the past few days.

The phrase reminds me how easy it is to let scripture remain abstract when real people are suffering around us. The word peacemaker is often misunderstood. It doesn't mean passivity, silence, or letting people walk all over you. Peacemaking starts internally, attempting to make peace with ourselves, then moves to our loved ones, and beyond that to the wider world. It is about seeing something wrong and refusing to look away.

Peacemakers stand with the grieving, listen to the wounded, ask hard questions about harmful systems, and care about accountability.

Let's be honest—none of this is easy, and fear is always present. So, this week's invitation is to keep choosing love, showing up for those in pain, praying for peace, and working for justice. May you have the courage to be a peacemaker in your life, home, work, and community.



Choral Scholarships

Music is an important part of the life of St Oswald's church in Ashbourne, especially through the musical ministry of the choir. We are proposing a **new set of choral scholarships**.

Ideally, **4 students** ('scholars') will have mentored places in the choir, alongside more experienced singers. This will optimally be one per voice part (soprano/alto/ tenor/bass); the expectation is that you will be Y10 and upwards (i.e. age 15-18).

Scholars will be expected to regularly attend choir practice, and at least one of the two services on Sunday. You will **gain experience** of a vast range of repertoire, improved choral singing skills, teamwork with adults, regular gold standard music in services and excellent sight-reading skills. This gives you experience to enable you potentially to apply for a choral scholarship at university, and to add to UCAS forms when applying for university/college. In return, we will offer scholars 30 minutes of **tuition**, at the end of choir practice. This will cover sight reading, aural skills, and general music perception. A basis for this will be the RSCM *Voice for Life Singing Awards* – St Oswald's has had a good track record of young singers gaining Bronze, Silver and Gold awards (NB the Awards are about to be submitted for OFQUAL accreditation giving them value on a UCAS form).

You will receive an honorarium of **£100** for the year plus **£1 for each practice and service** attended. St Oswald's church choir has an excellent reputation for good music sung in our church as well as for weddings elsewhere, services in cathedrals (including York Minster, Salisbury and Hereford) and concerts too.

Readings

February Readings

February reading notes

February 1st Presentation

Malachi 3.1-5 The prophet, whose name means 'my messenger', warns his listeners that God will shortly come to judge the nation which has broken his Laws. They must repent.

Luke 2.22-4

After the birth of a child, the parents had to visit the Temple to present the baby to God and make an offering, dependent on their wealth (Levit.12:8). On this occasion, the devout old man, Simeon and the prophetess Anna, recognised the significance of the baby. Simeon praised God, but warned Mary of the sorrows that lay ahead.

February 8th 2 before Lent

Romans 8.18-25 Paul warns his readers that though they suffer for their faith now, they must wait patiently for what is to come.

Matthew 6.25-34 *Jesus taught his disciples*

In his great 'Sermon on the Mount' Jesus told his disciples that worry about the future was unnecessary. He pointed to the natural world and to the splendours of King Solomon, renowned for his wealth. Worry was only the response of Gentiles!

February 15th Next before Lent

Exodus 24.12-18 The account of how Moses receives the Law and the covenant is made with God is full of symbolism. The shedding of blood signifies a binding agreement, fire represents the presence of God, and the shared meal seals the promises.

Matthew 17.1-9

Matthew's account of the Transfiguration drew closely on Jewish traditions as recorded in Exodus 24 when Moses met God on Mount Sinai - God spoke to his people, the covenant was made, and the Law was given.

*February 18th Ash Wednesday

2 Corinthians 5. 20b - 6:10 Paul assures the Christians in Corinth that despite the suffering that he himself has also endured, they must also remain faithful.

Matthew 6:16-21 *Jesus said to his disciples*

Fasting was a religious practise by many devout Jews, but some made sure that others were made aware of their piety by putting ash on their heads. God would reward the truly faithful.

February 22nd Lent 1

Genesis 2.15-17; 3.1-7 In this older account of creation, the writer describes how, after creating the world, God created human beings, setting them in his garden to be its stewards. They were warned they must not eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil

Matthew 4.1-11

After his baptism Jesus retired to the wilderness, a place of solitude and potential danger. There, he struggled with the temptations set by 'the Satan', the prosecuting adversary of Job 2:1-8. Jesus answered with quotations from the Hebrew scriptures and Satan left, defeated.

1st February: Candlemas - Presentation of Christ in the Temple

Malachi 3.1-5

The prophet, whose name means 'my messenger', warns his listeners that God will shortly come to judge the nation which has broken his Laws. They must repent.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years. Then I will draw near to you for judgement; I will be swift to bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear me, says the Lord of hosts.

Luke 2.22-40

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.' Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.' And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything

required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

[Retreat in Daily Life](#)

What's it all about?

Yes, exactly. That's just the sort of thing we talk about.

No, I mean, what's a Retreat in Daily Life?

It's a chance to talk about important things with a spiritual guide. This retreat offers a framework for focused prayer and discernment over approximately 40 days, while continuing our routines and home life.

Many of us don't have the luxury of spending time away at a secluded and peaceful retreat house. Instead, we contract time to retreat, not away from our normal life but in it – taking time to attend, to align, to wait, and then to act.

How does it work?

We gather a group from various communities who commit to the retreat starting at the beginning of Lent. Then, over six weeks, we meet all together twice to open and close the retreat. The flow is as follows:

Sunday 8 February at 2pm at St Oswald's Church

The opening session of the retreat, where retreatants and retreat guides meet. We share, dream a little, pray, and keep silence.

- We go back to our everyday households, neighbourhoods, and communities - committed to a simple daily practice of prayer, reading, and contemplation.
- Individually, we meet with a retreat guide for about 40 minutes each week to reflect on what is happening in our prayer.
- We continue our daily practices and reflections, and our weekly meeting with a guide.

Sunday 22 March at 2pm at St Oswald's Church

- We gather at the end of six weeks to listen to each other, to listen to God together, to encourage, to share - and draw our 'retreat' to a close.

And a retreat guide?

You are accompanied during this retreat by an experienced spiritual accompanier who will listen to you and listen with you as you reflect on what you are discerning and hearing each day, in your prayer and in your faith community. They support your discernment and accompany you through the weeks - praying, reflecting, underlining, and exploring with you.

Is there a cost?

We ask for a small donation of £10 to cover the cost of materials. If you cannot afford that, no problem at all, we'd still love to have you join us! We'll collect that at the opening service.

Okay, I'm interested... what do I need to do next?

Yup. Fair question.

Peter will be delivering these items to Aquabox in Wirksworth. A very big thank you to those people who have been sorting out their cupboards and whose unwanted items will make their way to the benefit of others inside humanitarian relief boxes.

We historically have collected used towels and patterned duvet covers. However, Aquabox are saying NO MORE TOWELS FOR THE MOMENT but please continue with fabrics/duvet covers which are lovingly made into discreet sanitary wear for women living in countries where they cannot access such items. The boxes are filled with many other items including groundsheets, pots and pans, utensils and tools. The boxes themselves are robust enough to transport these items anywhere in the world as well as be used as beds for newborn babies, reservoirs for clean drinking water and much more.
